Generous donors made the holidays brighter for those in need of housing support again this past season, with Home for the Holidays and the Tree of Hope raising a combined total of \$25,638 to help area residents with housing insecurity.

A range of festive baskets, created by the advisory board, drew a crowd of willing donors to the Cathedral social hall on December 8. Those attending enjoyed light refreshments, fellowship, and a selection of Christmas songs performed by students from Aquinas Academy.

The event brought in \$7,551 in sponsorships and ticket purchases.

The Tree of Hope, which stands as a silent, shining reminder of the need in our community, brought in \$18,597.

As always, The Bethlehem Project's board is extremely thankful to our sponsors-both businesses and individuals- and to our donors for supporting

the mission to prevent homelessness in Greensburg and the surrounding communities.





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Bethlehem Project Expands Service Area

Due to increased challenges meeting housing costs in central Westmoreland County, the Bethlehem Project's Board of Advisors has approved an expansion of the housing ministry's service area to include Herminie, Manor, Norvelt, Scottdale and United.

"These five communities were identified by Catholic Charities, which manages intakes and referrals for all requests for assistance from The Bethlehem Project, as areas where people are in need of the help we can provide," said advisory board interim president Jerry Zufelt.

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HELPING LOCAL SHELTERS

Thanks to your generosity, The Bethlehem Project donated items to the clients at our local shelters for the fourth calendar quarter of 2024.

Shopping for the Union Mission was completed by board member Ray Hoehler and included 15 Zone One bus passes, 10 pill planners, eight pairs of steel-toed boots, 25 packages of cotton swabs, and 35 manicure sets.

Board member Debbie Scarpitti shopped for the Welcome Home shelter which requested shower curtains, 10 packages of diapers, four packages of baby wipes and 10 pairs of slipper socks.

And, assistance to clients of the Blackburn Center was fulfilled by board member Jane Szczygiel. The list included four laundry hampers, a baby stroller, three packages of 18-count hairbrushes, four 4-piece bed pillow sets, and \$94.13 was applied to their Westmoreland Transit account.

At the January meeting, the board approved the shopping for the first quarter of 2025.

The total spent for each shelter was \$750 and all purchased items went directly to assist the clients.

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The communities of Herminie, Manor, Norvelt, Scottdale and United join Bovard, Crabtree, Derry, Forbes Road, Grapeville, Greensburg, Hannastown, Hunker, Jeannette, Latrobe, Ligonier, Luxor, Mount Pleasant, New Alexandria, New Derry, New Stanton, Penn, West Newton and Youngwood in the Bethlehem Project's service area.

She was able to find new employment and started her job. However, she would not be paid in time to meet her rent's due date. She was now in danger of eviction.

She turned to The Bethlehem Project, which was able to assist her, and with her new job, Patty will once again be self-sufficient.

Patty stated that being unemployed was extremely difficult, and the threat of eviction only added to her stress. She had never had to ask for help before and found it hard. Patty related that she was very grateful for the assistance and appreciated being treated with respect and kindness.
